The Four "P's"

Greetings, Hubbard Family! Happy October! This month, I would like to offer the words from Bishop Ough as he spoke to the clergy during Annual Conference:

"I don't often read the Book of Ezra, but recently, I was drawn back to the story of King Cyrus of Persia allowing those exiled from Jerusalem to return to rebuild the temple – the house of the Lord, the God of Israel (Ezra 3).

In the second month of the second year of their return, the foundation of the temple had been laid. But, the people had very different responses. Many were filled with joy and sang praises to God for the new thing that had been brought forth. Many others, who had seen the first temple and knew what "normal" should look like, were filled with grief, and wept aloud. The scripture says no one could distinguish the sound of the people's weeping from the loud rejoicing.

I think this tension between the old normal and the new reality exists in many of our churches. What I observe among us, and what I certainly have racing around in my soul, is both lament and rejoicing. I lament that there will be no return to normal; that the foundations of the church have been shaken to the core and cannot be put back together to look the way they looked in the past. Yet, I rejoice in the opportunity to re-envision, re-create, re-invent our congregations and denomination.

I believe the forces and dynamics unleashed by the four P's – pandemic, postponement, protests and politics – will forever change our churches and our ministries. What an opportunity! Do you realize how seldom everything is unfrozen and can be reshaped? I see a vital, technologically savvy, culturally relevant, richly diverse, fully inclusive, theologically astute, re-energized evangelical Wesleyan movement emerging from these powerful, life and ministry-altering forces.

This dissonance between rejoicing and grief, between being re-energized and the weariness of constant adaptation. often

leaves me feeling isolated, alone, searching for that new song to sing. But then I am reminded, I am not alone. I am not the only one experiencing dislocation, dis-orientation, dissonance. And, I am reminded that our ever-faithful God precedes me, holds me, protects me, strengthens me, sustains me, illuminates my path. Several weeks ago, Rev. Cynthia Williams, the River Valley District Superintendent, and new Dean of the Cabinet, introduced a powerful Collect that expresses my heart better than I can with my own voice:

What are we to say,

except that it is not our own wisdom which will make sense of all that has happened, but a wisdom which knows the hearts of us all.

What are we to say,

except that it is not our own heart alone that will give us strength and courage, but the hearts of those with whom we share community and faith.

What are we to say,

except that it is not our will alone which will see us through the confusion and pain of these days, but the will of the One whose ways are

> compassion and comfort, reconciliation and peace, forgiveness and understanding.

O Lord, when I am bewildered and the world is all noise and confusion around me and I don't know which way to go and am frightened, then be thou with me. Put thy hand on my shoulder and let thy strength invade my weakness and thy light burn the mist from my mind. Help me to step forward with faith in the way I should go.

We are all on the same journey toward perfection in our love of God and neighbor – John Wesley's very definition of holiness. Let us go forth to Be the Light – Live Hope!

You are my church, my faith community, and my source of support and encouragement. I will miss you when I retire in December. And, even after I retire, I will need and cherish your prayers. Be assured, I will continue to pray for each of you and this covenant community, as well. Thank you."

Influenza Season During the Pandemic

What is the difference between Influenza (Flu) and COVID-19?

Influenza (Flu) and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory

illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses. Both can result in serious illness, including illness resulting in hospitalization and death. Because some of the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone. Testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis. Flu and COVID-19 share many characteristics, but there are some key differences between the two.

COVID-19 & Flu Similarities

Differences

Signs & Symptoms

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Fatigue
- Sore throat
- · Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle pain, body aches
- Headache
- · Vomiting, diarrhea

When Symptoms Appear

1 or more days can pass between becoming infected and experiencing symptoms.

COVID-19:

 Change in or loss of taste and smell

Flu:

 Symptoms appear 1-4 days after infection.

COVID-19:

 Symptoms appear 2-14 days after infection (typical is 5 days).

How Long Someone Can Spread the Virus

It is possible to spread the virus before symptoms appear.

Flu:

1 day before symptoms & up to 7 days after symptoms first appear.

COVID-19:

2 days before symptoms & up to 10 days after symptoms first appear.

How it Spreads

Both spread between COVID-19: people who are in close contact with one another (within 6 feet). Both are spread mainly by respiratory droplets made when someone with the virus coughs, sneezes or talks. Droplets can land in the mouth or nose of someone nearby and be inhaled into the lungs.

It may be possible to get infected by physical contact, shaking hands or touching a surface or object with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose or eyes.

- More contagious among certain populations and age groups.
- Observed to have more superspreading events, i.e., can quickly and easily spread to lots of people and result in continuous spread.
- Some data suggests spread may occur through small particles, such as those in aerosols, in some specific circumstances.

"Flu season" in the United States typically begins in October and runs through March. Flu activity often begins to increase in October and November, usually peaks between December and February, but can last as late as May.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends 3 actions to prevent flu:

- 1. Get a flu vaccine:
- 2. Practice everyday preventive actions; and
- Take antiviral medication to treat flu if your provider prescribes them.

Getting a flu shot this year is more important than ever. It is expected that flu viruses and the virus that causes COVID-19 will both be spreading this fall and winter. Flu vaccines have been shown to reduce the risk of flu illness. And getting a flu shot will help reduce the burden on healthcare facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic and help preserve healthcare resources. It is recommended to get a flu vaccine by the end of October but getting vaccinated anytime during the flu season can help protect you.

Living with the Pandemic: Minnesota and Hubbard County COVID-19 Activity

- The 7-day rolling average of the percentage of tests that are positive in Minnesota is 5.4%. The 7-day positivity rate was 6% at the end of August.
- During September, Minnesota saw the number of positive cases exceed 90,000 and is fast approaching 100,000. Over 2,000 Minnesotans have lost their lives to COVID-19. The United States reached a grim milestone of 200,000 COVID-19 deaths in the month of September.
- Cases of COVID-19 in Hubbard County more than doubled during the month of September from the case count at the end of August. Cases in our county have now surpassed 100. Hubbard County experienced it's first COVID-19 resident death in September. Neighboring counties also continue to see increases in positive cases. Significant increases in positive cases occurred in the last two weeks of September.
- The prior 14-day test positivity rate Hubbard County is at 6.3% (effective 9/29). The positivity rate was 3.7% at the end of August.

• The current 14-day case count per 10,000 residents in Hubbard County is >10. This is the number school districts consider when making decisions about education delivery models. If the case rate is less than 10, schools can provide in -person classes at all grade levels. Because of the increased case-rate, both Park Rapids and Nevis school districts converted to hybrid education models (i.e., a mix of in-person and distance learning) in late September. The 14-day case rate per 10,000 was 4.31 at the end of August.
