Be Still My Soul

There was once a man who lost everything. He was a farmer and lost all of his livestock. He had many children, and he lost them as well. He even lost what good health he had left. He lost everything. In spite of all these losses, in spite of all these hardships, this man had the most unique, faith-filled response I've ever heard. He said, "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord." This man, Job, did lose a lot. At the same time, though, Job rested his life in the hands of God trusting God to carry him through it all.

I doubt most of us would respond the same way Job did. Maybe we would, maybe at certain times we could, but I have to admit, it may be challenging for us to say "blessed be the name of the Lord" when we are facing serious challenges. That may not be our natural response, but it could be. In the face of loss, disease, and death, what comfort will we find in fury, or anger, or pain? Wouldn't it be much better to rest ourselves in the hands of God?

What Job went through always strikes me. Few of us will ever suffer such complete losses like Job did, although some of us will face similar situations. The question for us though is this, "How will you react when those times do come?" We could allow our grief in this world to swallow us alive, sapping our love for others, sucking out our will to live, crumbling our desires to even enjoy life. Thanks to Christ, though, the opposite could occur. Instead of folding inward upon ourselves and our grief, we could fall back into the arms of our loving God; the Creator of the heavens and the earth, and the Redeemer of all creation.

There is a particular hymn in our hymnal entitled "Be Still, My Soul" which does an excellent job guiding us into those loving arms of our God. When faced with loss, with physical pain and with death, the hymnist says this:

Be still, my soul; the Lord is on your side. Bear patiently the cross of grief or pain; Leave to your God to order and provide; In every change God faithful will remain. Be still, my soul; your best, your heavenly friend Through thorny ways leads to a joyful end.

"This project will create 60 homes for women and children and office space for Emma Norton Service." said Tonya Brownlow, the organization's executive director. "The great thing is, it will allow us to expand from 50 to 60 units and it will be their own apartment, versus what we have now, which is shared rooms."

A Soldier and His Quilt

"A quilt will warm your body and comfort your soul."

Pastor Lauren shared a story with the congregation recently; a story that bears repeating because It exemplifies why the Threads of Love Quilters continue to make quilts of all sizes and colors for people of all ages wherever they may be!

Here is how Pastor Lauren tells the story:

I was making a pastoral visit to a local woman and while at her home, her landlord stopped by. I introduced myself, saying I was the pastor at Hubbard United Methodist Church. "You are the pastor at Hubbard," he repeated, astonished, and again I said yes.

"In 2012, I was stationed in Kuwait," explained the landlord.

"One day I got an unexpected package in the mail. In the box was a quilt from the Hubbard United Methodist Church. You can't imagine how much I appreciated that quilt — most people don't know that it can get cold at night in Kuwait. I still have that quilt and I love it!"

Since 2007, women from HUMC have been making quilts to warm those in need of caring and comfort. They have been mailed overseas to women and men in the military, to those in nursing homes or to those returning home from the hospital. They have been delivered to local schools and organizations that care for those in need.

May you be free from cares and woes, When under this quilt you seek repose.

Quilting will resume Tuesday, September 14, at 9:30 am in the Fellowship Hall. The group traditionally breaks for a "bring your own" lunch at noon, with time allowed for discussion and devotions. You do not need to be a sewer or knitter to join; there are plenty of tasks for everyone.

Over the past year and a half, there have been countless churches that have gone through total devastation, by natural disasters, accidental fires, and pandemic.

Our team has chosen 3 churches around the country that we feel could use a bit of encouragement. Below are their brief stories. We hope you join us as we gather together to create cards of encouragement and hope to send to these churches as they discern what comes next...

"Discouraged but not in despair"

On Sunday, July 11th, a fire consumed the Vidalia United Methodist Church in Vidalia, Louisiana. The fire resulted in a complete loss of the building that dates back to 1958.

Rev. Dr. Steve McDonald was set to preach just his second sermon at Vidalia, as his new appointment was just beginning.

"This was not how I envisioned my ministry here to begin," said McDonald. "But I am doing fine, and the people here are doing fine. The building is gone, and with it, a lot of treasured memories. The congregation will continue, and we may even see this as an opportunity God gives us to start again."

Several of the church members who remained upbeat, despite the destruction of the building said, "Guess what? God is still here!" On Monday, July 12th, the Vidalia United Methodist Church voted unanimously to begin the process of exploring a rebuild of the church. Rev. McDonald says there is a remarkable feeling of resolve amidst the congregation. He says the congregation continued to ask, 'how can we move forward?'

"It reminds me of Paul's word to the Corinthians when he speaks of being discouraged but not in despair," said McDonald. "We are discouraged, but we are not in despair because God is still God, and we are still His people. We look forward to discerning what's next and cooperating with what God lays out in store for what's to come."





Searching for a new home...

On June 25, 2021, A large fire that is still being investigated has destroyed the building where New Hope UMC in De Pere, Wisconsin was located.

The building is a total loss and they have lost all property that was in the building. Bethany UMC in Green Bay has graciously opened their doors to New Hope so that they may continue to hold worship. Pastor Rick Haberland continues to remind the congregation that the church is more than a building and remains optimistic

Finance Report:

Our year to date Operating Income is \$192,476.42 with year to date Operating Expenses of \$185,863.86, leaving us Net Operating Income of \$7,612.86. We have applied for forgiveness of our PPP Loan. This transaction will actually increase our operating income by about \$30,000.

Richard Anderson reported that the 3rd quarter giving statements have been sent out.

Joann Torfin reported that offering has been down, but 75% of the pledges have been paid.

On-Going Business:

COVID-19 – Hubbard County positivity rate has dropped below 5%, therefore we will not require masks and social distancing and there will be coffee fellowship. We will review it each week.

Living with the Pandemic: Minnesota and Hubbard County COVID-19 Activity

 Minnesota has had more than 610,000 COVID cases and more than 7600 deaths. Statewide, new COVID cases and hospitalizations

have been increasing since mid-July.

- Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) Commissioner, Jan Malcom, noted on 7/26 that 3 out of 4 new COVID cases in Minnesota are due to the delta variant. The delta variant is more contagious and is resulting in more severe disease. Commissioner Malcom also noted that vaccine breakthrough cases in Minnesota are rare. To date, 99.9% of fully vaccinated Minnesotans have not contracted the COVID virus. Unvaccinated individuals account for the majority of new COVID cases, hospitalizations and deaths.
- Hubbard County COVID case volumes in July declined from the previous month.

 The 14-day test positivity rate for Hubbard County is 0.6% for the period ending 7/20/21.




 Vaccination rates through 7/22/21 for Minnesotans and Hubbard County residents are as follows:



* Vaccination rates were updated to correct county resident assignments. Hubbard County saw an increased vaccination rate due to residents that had previously been attributed to neighboring counties.

Hubbard County continues to lag statewide vaccination rates.

The United States has seen an uptick in COVID cases and hospitalizations over the last month. Community transmission maps from 6/25 to 7/25/21 show a significant increase in the level of COVID transmission.
