Dear Hubbard Church Family,

You have no doubt noticed the increasing darkness. I go to bed early in the dark, and I wake up in the dark. And in fact, As I write this, it is snowing for the first time this season. The hours of light are getting shorter and shorter, and I find myself grateful for lingering twilight.

How ironic that the most hopeful season of the church year begins as the darkness increases. In the weeks to come, we light candles on the Advent wreath, and it's not a moment too soon. These lights of hope stand against the growing darkness. And every week, as we add the flame of another candle, the light will increase and shine brighter even as the darkness comes sooner and lasts longer.

In this season of Hope, and as this year of Hope 2022 comes to its end, I share with you some things that I do see that give me hope:

1. Our congregation continues to find new creative ways to do ministry.

As I read and re-read the minutes from the various committees I am so impressed and encouraged by your continued efforts. Sure, some things have paused. Yes, some priorities have been re-evaluated and energies placed in new directions. And, we have also begun new ministries! This is all good as we continue to be church together and church for the sake of the world. I am grateful to the Spirit that is at work among and through us as the work of Christ continues.

2. We have wonderful leadership!

In the past year, we have welcomed several new members and attenders and they bring with them new energy, perspective, and ideas. And our more seasoned members and attenders have provided much needed stability and the blessing of trusted relationships that keep our church in motion and helps reduce anxiety.

- 3. We have renewed joy in being together again...safely. As pandemic restrictions have eased, We are able to worship and have fellowship together. And if and when the time arises, I do not mind wearing a mask if it means we can sing together and gather in the same space. I love hearing the voices of others raised in song and prayer. It has felt like salve on a wound to share the peace, sing alto to someone's soprano, and hear combined voices pray the Lord's prayer together in the rhythm and cadence of voices in unison. While I truly believe that some sense of community can be achieved and appreciated through Zoom, YouTube, and Facebook live, the joy and value of the community gathered in person is also true and real.
- Our United Methodist Conference is connected through Faith Formation Groups, Training opportunities, Leadership Seminars, Pastoral Check-Ins, and various other Zoom meetings.

While I have missed being able to travel to my various conference meetings, in many ways we are more connected as a conference than we have ever been. Pastors from all of the 5 districts can gather in virtual classrooms and discussion groups. We are church together in a whole new way, gathering to discuss and wrestle with conversations about issues of race, justice, scriptural interpretation, and to consider and plan various ministry efforts.

5. God is at work!

In all our efforts, in all our re-evaluations, in all the changes and future uncertainty, the Spirit of the living Christ is gathering, inspiring, supporting, and guiding. We are discovering again what it means to be church, what the purpose of the Body of Christ is in this world, and who we are in mission together. I see a new hunger for deeper spirituality and for meaningful connectedness to God and each other. I see ministry efforts taking on a life of their own. I see details and pieces falling together. I see a willingness to experiment, to try new things, to jump even when the landing is unclear.

There is much to be hopeful for because of what we can see even as we continue to hope for that which is still becoming. As Thanksgiving comes and goes, As Advent candles are lit, as the glow from the manger bed grows brighter, as we strain to hear the songs of angels, remember that you are not alone. In hopeful anticipation of Christmas and a blessed New Year, I believe it is not too soon to share the following verse from "It Came upon the Midnight Clear" that speaks anew to our present circumstances:

And you, beneath life's crushing load, whose forms are bending low, who toil along the climbing way with painful steps and slow: look now, for glad and golden hours come swiftly on the wing; Oh, rest beside the weary road and hear the angels sing!



PARISH NURSE NOTES

Influenza Season and Bivalent COVID Booster Vaccine

It's Time for Flu Shots

Influenza or "flu" season in the United States typically begins in October and runs through March.

The Center for Disease Control and Preventions (CDC) recommends 3 actions to prevent flu:

Get a flu vaccine

Practice everyday preventive actions

Avoid close contact with people who are sick

Cover cough and sneezes

Wash your hands often

Stay home if you are sick

Take antiviral medication to treat flu if your provider prescribes them.

There a several benefits of getting a flu vaccination. Flu vaccines can keep you from getting sick with flu. Flu vaccinations have been shown to reduce severity of illness in people who get vaccinated but still get sick. Flu vaccination can reduce the risk of flu-associated hospitalization. Getting vaccinated protects you and the people around you. It is recommended to get a flu vaccine by the end of October but getting vaccinated anytime during the flu season can help protect you.

Bivalent COVID Booster Vaccine

A new bivalent COVID booster vaccine is available for anyone age 5 and older. This booster is formulated to better protect against the most recently circulating COVID-19 variants that are more transmissible and immune-evading. The bivalent booster is a single dose given at least 2 months after completion of your primary vaccination series, or 2 months after any pervious booster. Bivalent boosters are available at Hubbard County Public Health and at local retail pharmacies. Being up to date by getting the bivalent COVID booster is considered one of your best defenses against serious illness from COVID-19.
